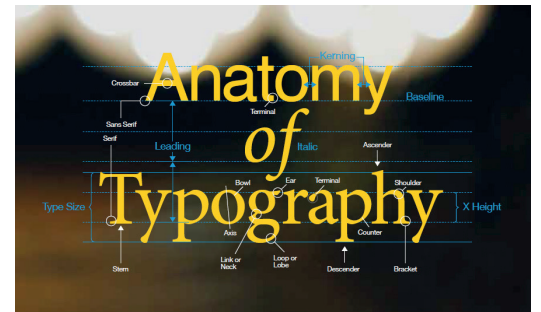

### 1.2 Form and Space

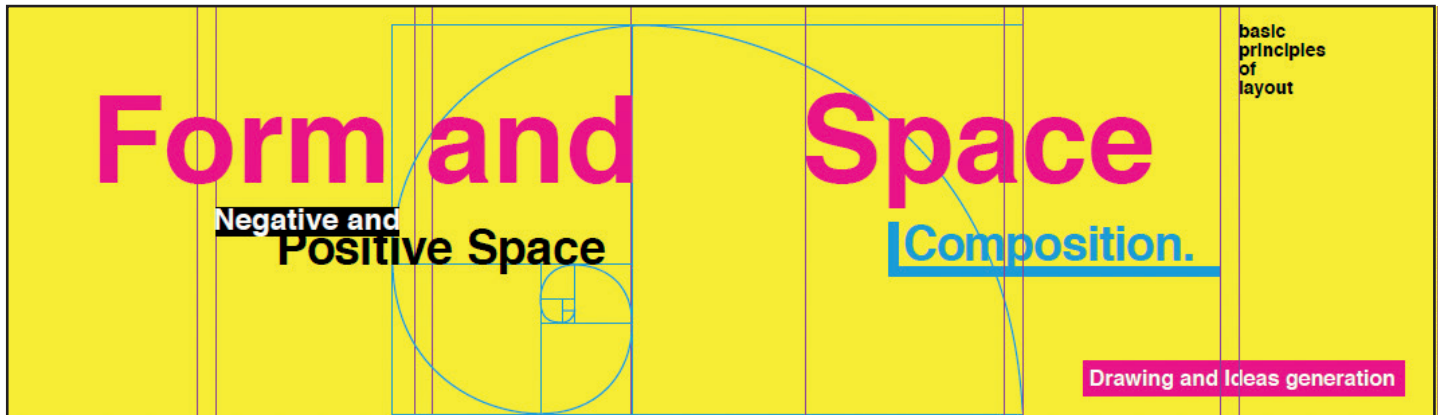
